
NORMAL COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL THEATRE HOUSE POLICIES

Producer's Notes

Most of us have forgotten how to listen. In the chaos of our lives, stress and schedules run right over the careful, thoughtful practice of honestly focusing on one person at a time and just hearing them – just considering what they really have to say.

Anna Deavere Smith may be more familiar to audiences through her role on TV's *The West Wing* or *Nurse Jackie*, but she is primarily a one-woman performance artist who has specialized in, simply, listening. For example, her play *Twilight: Los Angeles 1992* opened on Broadway in 1994. In the violent aftermath of the Rodney King trial, Deavere Smith went out and interviewed dozens of people from all walks of life. Then she performed those interviews *as those people*: gender, age, race didn't matter: just the honesty of the words.

After 9/11, the students of Stuyvesant High School, located four blocks north of the Twin Towers, created a work of art in the manner of Deavere Smith. They interviewed students, teachers, and staff to discover the stories of their world after the catastrophe. The result is touching, funny, lively, ordinary, confusing, and occasionally random, just like people.

Ten years after the attacks of September 11, 2001, it's very interesting to revisit this work and see what we remember and what we didn't know. Of course, most of this company was in kindergarten through third grade so this has been a bit of a history lesson as well. As always, it has been a journey of many. My personal thanks go to our alumni directors who have given generously of their time and talents. Once again, the students have amazed and delighted me with the talent and dedication they bring to this program. Finally, the parents who support this program may never know how important they are. Trust me; you are.

Thank you for supporting the experimental part of our season. The thrust stage makes the actor/audience relationship much more personal and we appreciate your contribution to this very different theatre experience. Enjoy...and listen.
