



Sometimes you can simplify or compare expressions by substituting equivalent expressions.



Rewrite

 as a power of 2. $(2^{2})^{\frac{1}{4}} = 2^{\frac{3}{4}} = 2^{\frac{1}{2}}$

Rewrite
$$\sqrt[4]{32}$$
 as a power of 2.

$$2^{10} = (\sqrt[3]{32})^{6}$$

$$2^{10} = (\sqrt[3]{25})^{6}$$

$$2^{10} = ((2^{5})^{1/3})^{6} \longrightarrow (2^{5/3})^{6} \longrightarrow 2^{30/3} = 2^{10}$$


